A **guardian** or **social worker** will help to make decisions

with you and for you

Professionals (police officers, lawyers, guardians, social workers, judges, doctors, etc.) are people you can **trust**

You have the right to a **free lawyer**

You have the right to a **free interpreter**

free support (food,

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

You or one of your friends may be a victim of trafficking, without realising it.

Have you been in a situation in which you had to:

- → have sex or perform sexual acts?
- **7 work** (for example, in someone's house doing housework or childcare. a factory or a restaurant)?
- → beg, steal or commit crime?
- ₱ grow, carry or deal drugs?
- remove your organs to sell?
- 7 Repay a 'debt' by working or some other service? providing

Have you/your family been threatened? If you answer "yes" to one of these questions, you may be victim of trafficking.

Human trafficking is a serious crime and an abuse of your rights.

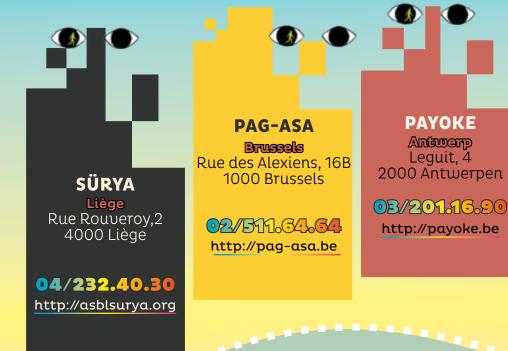
Talk to a professional you trust or to PAG-ASA, Sürya or Payoke if you are concernedso they can help stop the abuse, and protect other young people.

- If you are from another country, you need a residence permit to stay in Belgium.
- 7 In order to ask for a residence permit, you might need to go to the Immigration Office and tell them your story. If you have no legal caregiver in Belgium, the Immigration Office will contact the Guardianship Service so that you can be appointed a quardian.
- With your quardian you can discuss the best procedure to get a residence permit.

But remember, you do not need official documents to benefit from the child protection system.

In Belgium, all children without a legal caregiver are appointed a guardian until they turn 18.

Your guardian will help you apply for a residence permit and ensure that you get access to school, to medical/psychological care, and to appropriate accommodation. He/she is someone you can trust and who will act with and for you.

If you don't feel at ease with your guardian, you can talk to the Guardianship Service. If you experience conflict with your guardian you can go, alone or accompanied, to the **Judge of Peace** to be assigned a new guardian.

In Belgium, every child has the right to a **free lawyer** and a **free interpreter**. The information you share with them is confidential (they cannot repeat it) unless it is needed in order to protect you.

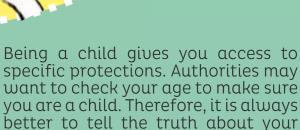
